

Marine Communications Systems

The new course on Marine Radio Communications will be taught Wednesday nights starting on 16 February. This new course is a complete rewrite and update of the old ME102 course.

Marine Communications Systems is an in-depth, nine chapter review of those systems available to the recreational boater. Radio history and spectrum definitions are presented along with definitions of radio circuits that the student should learn, to choose the best communications method for his/her situation. There is a new chapter devoted to the Global Maritime Distress and Safety System (GMDSS) and a updated chapter on FCC Rules and regulations to set the stage for instruction of radiotelephone operating procedures (both voice and digital messaging are covered). The remaining chapters cover High Seas radio (an expanded section on MF/HF and a new section on satellite communications) and other marine communications systems such as Family Radio Service transceivers. There is also a new chapter on troubleshooting of radio installations. The chapter on Voice Radio Operations has been expanded and includes miniscenarios and audio clips of both routine and emergency calling procedures augmented by in-class practice scenarios. A CD will be provided that contains all classroom PowerPoint slides, all audio clips used to demonstrate correct calling and testing procedures and an interactive Radio Tutorial from The BoatU.S. Foundation.

If it has been over five years since you took ME102, you are encouraged to audit this class to update and expand your knowledge of Marine Radio Communications.





Exploring a Florida Treasure By Captain Helen Deitrick-Kovach

We travelled to Jacksonville the first week in November to participate in a 10 day cruise down and back on the St. John's River. With great anticipation, the members of the flotilla for the St John's River Cruise assembled at the Jacksonville Municipal Marina. Four boats were in Jacksonville and we would be joined by several others at various times during the trip. The smallest boat was 37 feet, and the largest 50 ft. The Water Taxi was summoned to ferry the crowd across the river to the Chart House where we were joined by several locals who were not going on the cruise but were there to lend support. Everyone had a good time meeting new folks and enjoying a meal. We appointed a cruise director, determined the working channel for VHF and agreed upon a morning departure time. We then headed back to the Jacksonville Municipal Marina by the water taxi.

Tuesday was a great weather day and we set out from the marina enroute to Six Mile Creek and the Outback Crab Shack. We had a short wait for the railroad bridge in downtown Jacksonville before we could really get going. We were joined by several other boats at the junction of the Ortega River. The river at this point is wide and majestic. When we made the turn

to Six Mile Creek for our first evening's stop, the water got really thin for those of us drawing more than 4 ft. **Shalala** led the way and **Allez!** plowed a path for several deeper draft boats. By the end of the afternoon there were 11 boats on the 1500 ft. dock.

Dinner at The Outback was an interesting event full of local color complete with a band. The next morning the flotilla set out for Georgetown, FL. There were only four boats making this part of the journey. **Kindred Spirit** opted to anchor in Muddy Cove while the rest of us took a slip at the Georgetown Marina.

As we set out Thursday morning, we were joined by another boat that would make the trip for a couple of days. We wound our way toward Hontoon State Park. Make no mistake it is a scenic spot, but the docks are NOT designed for the size boats we showed up with: one 42ft, two 47 footers and a 50. You can understand why there are so many houseboat rental locations along the way. Nor is it equipped with 50A power. The 30 amp power is all on the same circuit so our Hubbell Smart Boxes were useless – so we camped on the dock. The finger piers are 22 ft long. The best part was dropping the dinks in the water and going exploring. Several dinks headed to Blue Springs in search of wild life and manatee. On adventurous captain went around the back side of Hontoon Island and found a wonderful collection of birdhouses. Thursday evening Social Hour was on the upper deck of **Allez!**. Friday evening found us all on board **Ataraxy**. Everyone got out and walked or ran on the trails around the Island - a welcome activity after being on board for a couple of days.

After Hontoon, four boats headed to Sanford. This part of the river narrows and twists around in circles. The possibility of seeing manatee, alligators, various types of birds and interesting plants is what makes this part of the river intriguing. It is definitely primeval. The weather was perfect even calm crossing Lake George. The main street in Sanford is full of art shops loaded with interesting local art. We arrived on Saturday so the Farmers Market was still going on. Dinner at the Willow Tree was excellent. It is a German restaurant and the food (and beer) was well worth the trip. Some friends who live nearby drove over to join us.

The flotilla droped their hooks at Turkey Island near Welatka. The couple who joined us for the Hontoon Island adventure have a house here and acted as taxi to ferry folks to their house for the evening.

Monday, the flotilla was on the move again. We decided to make it a long day and head for Doctors Lake. We took a lay day Tuesday to regroup. That was a good thing because it was rainy and windy. The weather cleared about 4 so the dingies went in the water and everyone went to Whities Fish camp for dinner.



Vessel Safety Checks

Vessel Safety Checks - Recommend that all squadron members get a Vessel Safety Check (VSC) of their boat this spring. For a VSC checklist visit our web site and on the left side of our front page click on the "VSC Checklist" item. After verifying that your boat is ready, contact one of our squadron Vessel Examiners to schedule you boat's Vessel Safety Check. Upon passing, your boat will be awarded the 2011 VSC Decal. Vessel Examiner Training - A class will be held in late February or early March (date to be determined) to train squadron members interested in becoming a Vessel Examiners (VE). Training will consist of two-hours in the class room going over Vessel Safety Check (VSC) procedures, followed by an open book exam and conclude with five supervised vessel examinations at Rivers Edge Marina.

Prior to class, a CD will be provided to each potential Vessel Examiner that includes the VSC Manual, VSC forms, PowerPoint slides of the VSC training class and other VSC material.
